



Vision and Values

We empower all of our children to embrace learning, achieve their full potential and build their emotional, social and physical well-being through a creative curriculum for excellence.





Intent

Children at Bramley Sunnyside use the Charanga music scheme, first and foremost, to help them to feel that they are musical and to develop a life-long love of music. We focus on developing the skills, knowledge and understanding that our children need in order to become confident performers, composers and listeners. Our curriculum introduces children to music from all around the world and across generations, teaching children to respect and appreciate the music of all traditions and communities.



Intent

Children will develop the musical skills of singing, playing tuned and untuned instruments, improvising and composing music, and listening and responding to music. They will develop an understanding of the history and cultural context of the music that they listen to and learn how music can be written down. Through music, our curriculum helps children develop transferable skills such as team-working, leadership, creative thinking, problem-solving, decision-making and presentation and performance skills. These skills are vital to children's development as learners and have a wider application in their general lives outside and beyond school.

Our musical opportunities also forge links with our community. All year groups have the opportunity to attend and perform at our local church, St. Francis' in Bramley, for Harvest, Christmas and Easter services. Our choir has various opportunities to perform including an annual Christmas service at Rotherham Minster, Young Voices and our Performing Arts club enable children to develop skills and participate in musical theatre productions. Children also have the opportunity to learn a variety of additional instruments through our partnership with Rotherham Music Service.

Rationale

01 Substantive Knowledge

focuses on developing children's skills and knowledge required for them to develop as musicians. This is achieved through deliberate practice and allows children to develop and demonstrate fluency of knowledge. It involves learning about music across a range of historical periods, genres, styles and traditions, including the works of the great composers and musicians.

02 Disciplianry Knowledge

in music is the interpretation on the interrelated dimensions of music and how this knowledge is used when singing, playing instruments, improvising and composing, to develop creative and original pieces and performances. Children work independently and collaboratively to interpret and combine the dimensions of music to create a specific and desired effect.


