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Our School Day

Breakfast Club: from 07:45 - 08:30 (bookable online via Arbor) at a cost of £4 per session.

School Starts: 08:40 (Doors open 08:30) School Ends: 15:10

- Year 3 will enter and leave by the Y3 front fire door, opposite the Flanderwell Lane pedestrian entrance.
- Years 4 and 5 will enter and leave via the fire exits onto the side yard.
- Year 6 will enter and leave via the glazed area onto the side yard.

All class teachers will greet your child at the start of the school day at the classroom door. Outer doors will close at 08:40, when the first morning session will promptly start. Children need to be in their classroom, seated at their desk, ready to commence learning before the doors are closed.

Whilst parents/carers can talk to the class teachers on the door, we will not be inviting adults into school without a prior appointment.

If your child comes to school on their own, we ask that they do not arrive before 08:30, and until the doors open, all children remain the responsibility of parents/carers.

If your child arrives after 08:40, they will need to come via the front office, where they will receive a late mark for their registration. If they arrive after 09:10, your child will receive an unauthorised absence mark for their morning session, which will impact their attendance.

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PE Uniform:

Indoor: White or black crew-neck t-shirt Outdoor: Black tracksuit or jogging bottoms White or black crew-neck t-shirt Black zip-up jacket, hoody or sweatshirt Trainers

The children should only come to school wearing their school PE kit on the days that they have PE and clothing must be in keeping with the uniform outlined above.

If your child has an afterschool sports club on a different day to PE then they may bring their PE kit to school to get changed into at the end of the day.

You can also purchase non-branded PE uniform from a wide range of supermarkets.



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We welcome children to come to school on their scooter or bike. Please ensure children walk with their scooter or bike once on school grounds for health and safety reasons.

Code of Dress:

Both the staff and Governing Body value and take pride in our dress code and believe that our uniform brings a sense of belonging:

Blue sweatshirt or cardigan

Navy, grey or black trousers, skirt or pinafore dress Navy, grey or black smart shorts from summer term II Pale blue, royal blue or white polo shirts Sensible dark shoes (no trainers)

Blue striped or checked gingham dresses from summer term II

In the interest of maintaining a safe and calm school environment, we do not allow the following things:

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- Jewellery (other than a small pair of stud earrings)
- Smart watches
- Extreme hair cuts or hair styles
- Fake tattoos or transfers

Children may wear nail varnish but we ask that acrylic and false nails are not worn for health and safety reasons.

Attendance:

If your child is ill, please inform us on the first day of absence and all subsequent days. You can email or phone the school office, leaving an answer phone message if no one is available. If we do not receive any communication, we will contact you via either telephone, text message or email from a safeguarding perspective.

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
It is very important that children attend school and do not take holidays during term time. We will only authorise any such absences for extenuating or compassionate reasons.

If you do choose to take your child out of school, you may incur a fixed penalty notice or further enforcement action, dependant on your child's percentage of attendance.

We do monitor attendance very closely and will be in contact once your child's attendance falls below 95%. Children whose attendance falls below 90% will be referred to Early Help, who will then make contact with parents/carers, where we will aim to work together effectively to make positive changes. Should no improvement be made then the School Attendance Matters Pathway will be followed. Please note that our own school attendance target for 2024-25 is 97%.

First Aid, Medicines and Infectious Diseases:

Every member of our support staff are trained in basic first aid and attend regular training sessions.



Please let us know if your child is diagnosed with anything infectious or contagious as we may need to inform other parents.

Children should not be sent into school with any medication without parents/carers completing a medical consent form for school to administer medication. These can be obtained from the school office.



Our Inclusive Curriculum

Our approach to teaching children on the SEND register:

In accordance with the 'code of practice,' we set very high expectations at Bramley Sunnyside Junior School. All staff working with children and young people with SEN or disabilities include everyone in every opportunity available, so that all of our children can achieve to their full potential. We ensure this by adapting our curriculum, offering adult support, with further bespoke learning opportunities, and by using relevant resources.



We have extremely dedicated staff who offer 1:1 support for children with specific learning needs and those who have received support from the School Inclusion Team (SIT). Class teachers work collaboratively with the Specialist Inclusion Team to tailor teaching and additional support towards filling identified gaps. We actively promote positivity and praise and believe that this enables every child to see the very best in themselves.

How we evaluate the effectiveness of provision in place for pupils on the SEND register:

Once a child has been identified as having a SEND need, class teachers will regularly assess learning.

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Our Inclusive Curriculum

Formative assessments take place each term and these are used as a basis to see the measurable progress that has been made and the effectiveness of interventions put into place. The SENDCo will then collate this information and use it accordingly to ensure that each child is provided with the right tools in order to make progress throughout the academic year. These may include interventions such as: 1:1 support, specific targeted programmes or pastoral support for any child who is working below age related expectations or who hasn't made the expected progress. After a minimum of 6 weeks, these interventions can then be evaluated and the impact analysed – this will then help to see if the specific form of intervention is appropriate for the child in question.

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It is ultimately the class teacher's responsibility for ensuring that all children's academic and social and emotional needs are met. If a child receives hours as part of an EHCP, this may not always be a one-to-one member of staff, it may include working with the teacher, specialised staff and the SENDCo.

For any child on our SEN register, regular meetings will be scheduled to review and agree progress.

Meet our Inclusion Team

Mrs Ashton (Pastoral, Inclusion and Support Manger) offers pastoral support to children and their families. She has a wealth of experience and has helped families through turbulent times such as: bereavement, illness, change to family circumstances or friendship issues. She also leads 'Lego Therapy' sessions to equip children with conflict resolution techniques.





Miss Green (Teacher and Mental Health First Aider) leads our whole school PSHE scheme (Kapow) and has recently received the 'Mental Health First Aider' accreditation. Miss Green also facilitates our children's team of Mental Health and Well-being Ambassadors who lead many initiatives across school.

Mrs Yellowley (Inclusion Specialist) works on a l:l basis with children who require pastoral support around anxiety or anger using recommendations from the educational psychology department. Mrs Yellowley uses cognitive behaviour therapy techniques to equip children with practical strategies and coping mechanisms.





Meet our Inclusion Team

Mrs Davis (Art Specialist) is also trained in art therapy and delivers weekly art therapy sessions to both upper and lower school, as well as a daily Nurture registration group. These calm and nurturing sessions help children to manage behaviours, process feelings, reduce stress and anxiety and increase self-esteem.





Mrs Stancliffe (Inclusion Specialist and HLTA) is trained in Emotional Literacy Support and work across school, as well as running the Nurture registration group with Mrs Davis.

Mrs Hughes not only is a teacher but a qualified counsellor who works with children one-to-one to listen and help them effectively navigate and manage their emotions.



Mrs Woolley (our SENDCo) also coordinates support and advice from Educational Psychologists, Occupational Therapists and Speech and Language Specialist. Such agency involvement will only take place with the consent of the child's parents and regular review meetings will be held to discuss progress.

We adopt a positive attitude towards all individual needs, and no child will be denied a place at our school due to a disability as long as places are available and we are able to meet the specific needs in the best interests of the child.

Lunch Time

Children can choose to bring a packed lunch from home, or a school meal from our three banded choice system, which are freshly prepared and cooked in our kitchen. If a drink is brought to school, it is to be a 'still' drink in a plastic bottle or drinks flask and is not to be placed on the children's learning desks.

The cost of a school meal from September 2024 is £3.20 per day (£16.00 per week) and payment must be made in advance on the Monday of each week. Please use our online payment system in Arbor. Further information will be sent to you regarding your log-in details. If you have any concerns, please get in touch with our school office team.

Snacks:

We encourage our children to bring a healthy snack such as a cereal bar or fruit for playtime. In line with Government and Healthy School Guidelines, we do not allow sweets, lollipops or chewing gum. Mrs Ashton runs a morning Tuck Shop at break time where snacks and drinks can be purchased at 60p.



The Banning of Nuts:

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Due to an ever increasing number of children and adults having nut allergies, please can we ask that nuts are not sent into school?



Am I Eligible for Free School Meals?


As a school, we can benefit from additional funding for all children who are registered for Free School Meals or who have been registered in the past 6 years. This funding provides many additional support mechanisms such as interventions, support staff and financial assistance for educational visits and activities.

If as parents/carers you receive one of the following, you may be able to claim for Free School Meals:

- Universal Credit (provided you have an annual net earned income of no more than £7,400, as assessed by earnings from up to three of your most recent assessment periods).
- Income Support.
- Income-based Jobseekers Allowance.
- Income related Employment Support Allowance.
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of State Pension Credit.
- Child Tax Credit as long as you have a yearly household income of less than £16,190 (as assessed by HM Revenue and Customs) and do not get Working Tax Credit.
- Working Tax Credit run-on (paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit).

If you think you are entitled to free school meals, please refer to the RMBC website.

Child Protection & Safeguarding:

If you ever have a safeguarding concern about a child, please contact Mrs Robson, the head teacher, who is the Designated Safeguarding Lead.

All staff in school have a duty of care for the safety and well-being of all of our children. We have very clear procedures in line with government legislation.

Concerns:

We aim to build effective relationships with all of our families to enable any worries to be easily solved through a discussion with the class teacher. If this is not possible, there are additional adults in school that can offer support, starting with the following staff:

Or if it is about your child's SEND needs or you feel you have seen a change in their behaviour, it might be more appropriate to speak to our SENDCO - Mrs Louise Woolley.

There is a formal process for making complaints, which can be accessed via the school office or on our website.

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School Records & Reports:

We continually track our children's progress, which we share at key points throughout the year:

- autumn and spring virtual or face to face options available
- summer term a written Record of Achievement.

Throughout the year, we hold numerous events to invite parents/carers into school to work alongside our children and to share their work.

School Communication

Our main method of communication will be via ClassDojo so that both class and school updates are held centrally and can be accessed by all.




Home Learning:

We want all of our children to develop a positive attitude towards their learning. All children are expected to read at least three times a week and learn their spellings and multiplication facts on a weekly basis at home.

For every ten reads at home, children will receive a stamp. After five stamps (50 reads), the children can visit our book vending machine in our Reading Nook.
